Asia and the Pacific Youth Symposium 2024 Online | Zoom Virtual Conference 17-19 April 2024

Theme: Weaving the Future of Asia and the Pacific through Inclusive Climate Action

I. Asia Pacific Youth Symposium Overview

The 4th Asia and the Pacific Youth Symposium (APYS4) is a social dialogue exchange that convenes governments, non-government organizations, youth, and other key stakeholders in development to discuss major and emerging climate issues in the region. These meaningful discussions ultimately revolve around the region's collective efforts to equip youth with the skills to access and create green jobs, encourage youth engagement in policy decisions and making processes, and for young women and girls to shape the Just Transition.

Building on the knowledge and learnings from previous youth events and programming, APYS4 will feature a fully online program composed of workshops and dialogues, which will culminate through the drafting of a Youth Agenda, bringing forward youth voices to the 57th Annual Meeting of the Asian Development Bank (ADB) Board of Governors (AM57) in Tbilisi, Georgia.

A fully online APYS event will remove barriers to entry, allow for simultaneous translation into multiple languages, and reduce safeguarding risks, facilitating participation from a wide range of Asia and the Pacific youth and a safe space for intergenerational dialogue between youth and adult stakeholders from diverse backgrounds.

APYS4 also provides opportunities for networking among ADB staff, government representatives, the private sector, the academe and think tanks, civil society, and youth-led or youth-centered organizations as well as fostering their collaboration on shared visions.

II. Objectives


The objectives of the APYS4 are to:

- Illustrate and consolidate the contribution of youth to innovative solutions for tackling climate change, including mobilizing climate financing, aligned with the first and third shifts of the Asian Development Bank's (ADB) new operating model.
- Ensure **inclusivity** in our symposium by actively promoting the participation of diverse youth groups, including those from marginalized and underrepresented communities, to foster a rich exchange of perspectives and ideas.
- Build the capacity of youth networks to engage with future challenges and develop the Youth Agenda further into an actionable strategy. This will further empower youth voices to effectively present their insights at the ADB's upcoming Annual Meeting in Georgia.











 Provide a multifaceted networking opportunity that bridges generations, sectors, and countries, while also offering youth a tangible chance to collaborate directly with international organizations and CSOs. This will also facilitate an impactful exchange of ideas, experiences, and best practices, further empowering youth to contribute effectively to societal and environmental solutions.

III. Background: Youth and Asia and the Pacific

With over 60% of the world's youth population residing in Asia and the Pacific,¹ the region stands at a pivotal crossroads where the involvement of young people is essential for promoting economic growth, fostering social inclusion, and tackling the pressing issue of climate change. Today's younger generation holds the right to significantly shape the policies and decisions of governments, the private sector, and international organizations—decisions that will have a lasting impact on their future.² In light of this, the region has seen a wave of youth-led climate activism, influenced by global movements like Fridays for Future and Extinction Rebellion. These young activists are increasingly visible and vocal, staging strikes, protests, and campaigns to urge action from leaders and policymakers. Their engagement is a testament to their critical role in driving climate policy and championing sustainable practices.

Young individuals are at the forefront of climate action, catalyzing movements across the region and demonstrating a strong commitment to environmental stewardship through high rates of volunteerism and awareness. Their firsthand experiences with the adverse effects of climate change fuel their resolve and innovation.³ As technical innovators and entrepreneurs, youth are bridging the gap between science and practical solutions, with initiatives highlighted by WeForum illustrating their capacity to drive meaningful change.⁴ Their unique perspectives, informed by direct insights into local needs and contexts, enhance the efficiency and sustainability of climate policies and programs, ensuring that these initiatives are deeply rooted in the realities of those most affected.⁵ This independence also empowers them to challenge existing norms and advocate for transformative policies, embodying a critical 'thinking and working politically' approach to climate action.⁶ Through these efforts, the youth of the Asia and the Pacific region are not just participants in the fight against climate change but are leading the charge towards a more sustainable and equitable future.



Recognizing the vital role of youth in climate action, it is crucial to engage them in developing policies for a sustainable future. Their deep understanding of community socioeconomics and technological prowess makes them key to climate resilience. As Asia and the Pacific faces the climate crisis, the fresh ideas and innovative approaches of young people are indispensable. This approach ensures inclusive climate action and empowers the generation that will bear the brunt of today's decisions. Through investments in renewable energy, sustainable transportation, and leveraging indigenous knowledge, youth initiatives are leading the shift towards a low-carbon economy. These efforts are pivotal in mitigating climate change and reshaping the economic landscape for a more equitable Asia-Pacific region. In this context, the ADB is tapping into youth innovation through its Strategy 2030, aiming for an inclusive society ready for climate challenges. As it nears its 60th anniversary, the ADB commits to making 75% of its operations climate-aligned by 2030 and plans to boost its funding by \$100 billion over the next decade to address the region's policy and development challenges.


IV. Activities

- APYS Knowledge Workshops: To showcase the development of youth-led initiatives in thematic areas, APYS will be conducting knowledge sessions to provide a better understanding of how youth are innovating around climate change.
- Youth Agenda. To provide recommendations to different stakeholders on what youth envisions as we fight climate change. Through insights gathered from these workshops, a youth agenda within three (3) topics related to the Role of Young Women in Just Transition, Climate Activism and Civic Spaces, and Green Skills will be developed to be shared with key actors in development (i.e., government, regional bodies, CSOs) during AM57.
- Capacity building To provide participants with an immersive platform for climate advocacy, offering avenues for acquiring expertise in policy formulation, strategic advocacy, community mobilization, entrepreneurial innovation in adaptation, collaborative networking, meticulous monitoring, and cultural sensitivity.
- Youth Giving Back to Youth during the ADB Annual Meeting: To provide a space
 for intergenerational dialogue, youth ambassadors are invited as resource speakers
 and correspondents in the digital space for other youth. Through their unique approach
 and command of the digital space, youth will utilize social media to streamline and
 share access to discussions on key development issues to foster a wider discussion
 across the region.
- Participation Hubs: To cater to a wider audience. APYS4 will be hosting two main participation hubs in Manila, Philippines and Kathmandu. Nepal. Young people engaged in the participation hubs will undergo in-person capacity building sessions and participate as live audience for the virtual APYS4.











V. Event Format, Structure, and Inclusivity

APYS4 will follow a virtual format conducted over three (3) days via Zoom, an online conferencing platform. The symposium is co-convened by the ADB, Plan International, and UNICEF where each co-convener will lead on facilitating specific topics per day taking a deeper dive into the following themes:

- Green Skills and Green Jobs (UNICEF): These workshops will explore innovative
 approaches to environmental stewardship and how young people shape the workforce
 of tomorrow. Participants will gain knowledge of the realm of eco-conscious
 professions, more sustainable career landscapes, and the latest green skills, unveiling
 opportunities for personal growth and positive global impact.
- Climate Activism and Civic Spaces (Plan International): These workshops will
 explore how youth lead in climate activism and shaping civic space. Delve into inspiring
 examples of youth-driven initiatives, discover effective strategies for grassroots
 activism, and explore avenues for civic engagement in the fight against climate
 change.
- Gender Transformation: Young Women and Girls in a Just Transition (Asian Development Bank): These workshops will explore the critical role of young women and girls in advocating for a fair and sustainable transition to a more just society. Delve into discussions on empowering young women and girls to lead environmental initiatives, promoting gender equality in climate action, and fostering inclusive policies for a brighter future.

APYS4 is a safe, conducive, and enabling space for everyone. The co-conveners are committed to making the event as inclusive and diverse as possible by ensuring the following measures are in place:

Speaker and Participant Sensitization: Ensuring that speakers and participants are sensitized to diverse perspectives and have a deeper understanding of how to strengthen and respect a safe space that fosters inclusive dialogue.


Linguistic Inclusivity: Providing simultaneous translation to multiple languages, accommodating diverse linguistic backgrounds, and enhancing accessibility for a wider audience. Watch parties are also to be organized in selected countries to cater to young people who have limited access to the internet.

Accessibility for Persons with Disabilities: Implementing measures to make the online event accessible for persons with disabilities by providing meeting transcriptions and simultaneous sign language interpretation.
