OVERVIEW - PUBLICATION LAUNCH AND PANEL DISCUSSION

The four regional development banks (RDBs) - African Development Bank (AfDB), Asian Development Bank (ADB), European Bank for Reconstruction and Development (EBRD), and Inter-American Development Bank (IDB) - are working with emerging and developing countries in their regions to address challenges and to make cities more livable.

VP Bambang Susantono delivered opening remarks for the launch of Creating Livable Cities: Regional Perspectives; a joint publication by the RDBs. As this year's rotating Chair of the RDB Group, ADB led preparation of the publication as a collaboration between the Sustainable Development and Climate Change

Department (SDCC), Economic Research and Regional Cooperation Department (ERCD), Strategy, Policy, and Partnerships Department (SPD) and key authors from urban sector divisions.

The publication takes stock of key urban patterns, and examines the types of policy interventions and solutions required to promote competitive, inclusive, equitable, environmentally sustainable and climateresilient cities - in short, "livable" cities.

Chief of Urban Sector Group, Manoj Sharma, and other contributing ADB staff participated in a panel discussion on urbanization trends, challenges, and urban development approaches across the regions.

URBAN CLIMATE CHANGE RESILIENCE LESSONS

Comparative analysis brings insight to common problems, challenges, solutions and lessons for resilience and livability. Data from the regions and cities can be further assessed to unlock 'what works' and 'what does not.'

Cities globally are threatened by environmental stresses and impacts of disasters and climate change. The '5E' planning approach of environment, equity, enablers, economic competitiveness and engagement' can jointly support resilience and competitiveness.

The bottom line of inclusive planning is 'putting people first'. Integrated urban action plans can help to bring people's voices into planning and decision-making.

Unplanned urban growth may determine the future of Asia's cities. Good urban planning has a lasting impact and determines whether a city becomes productive and competitive. In Asia there is a closing window of opportunity to get this right. ADB can draw on lessons from urbanized cities in Latin America, as well as China and India.

A differentiated approach is needed to address the challenges of shrinking cities. ADB can draw on lessons from Europe, such as clustering development and ensuring inclusive planning.

Integrated solutions for livable cities require a different way of working within ADB and cities. Solutions include stronger engagement upstream (including Country Partnership Strategies and Business Plans), enabling more multidisciplinary teams, knowledge-sharing and peer learning.
