#### Background

The ADB is hosting the third annual International Skills Development Forum in Manila during 10-12 December 2013. This follows two previous Forums held in 2011 and 2012, which have helped to build a dialogue platform on skills development in the Asia Pacific region. On the one hand, the events highlighted best practices from advanced countries such as Australia, Canada, Germany, Korea and Singapore and successful models in emerging economies; on the other hand, pressing issues for developing countries were also deliberated upon - such as skills for employability, for competitiveness, for greening economies and skills for informal labor markets. Participants explored, among other things, strategies for increasing access to skills development, improving the quality and market relevance of training, national qualification frameworks, enhancing private sector participation and improving the prestige of TVET.

The 2013 ADB International Skills Development Forum will focus primarily on the themes of Youth and Technology in the context of skills development.

**Youth:** It is clear that while growing skills-jobs mismatches are affecting populations and economies in general, the problems faced by youth are particularly acute. 1 in 6 people around the world are aged 15-24 and they are disproportionately concentrated in the world's poorest countries. 1 in 5 young people have not completed primary education and 1 in 8 young people are unemployed and have not got the skills needed for work. 1 in 4 young people earn less than \$1.25 a day. Youth unemployment is 2 to 3 times higher than average unemployment rates. This is of particular concern to countries that have large youthful populations. The ability to create a workforce of educated, skilled and creative youth will determine the success of countries in the journey to become competitive in knowledge based industries and participate in higher value global chains. The international development community is increasingly focusing on the issue of youth employment and the population of the address advantian/akille and isba mismatche. need to address education/skills and jobs mismatch. The 2013 ADB International Skills Development Forum aims to take this agenda forward with a call to action with concrete country level measures and initiatives for skills development and employment for youth. The Forum will include a special session to discuss policies and practices to strengthen youth participation in skills development for jobs and employability. A special feature will be the participation of a cross section of youth representatives from developing countries in Asia. The aim is to explore not only how policy makers and training institutions can support youth better for skills and employment, but also to engage on how youth can themselves contribute constructively to engaging with skills development and the world of work by collaborating with the government and the private sector.

**Technology:** Economic pressures and new models of education are presenting unprecedented competition to traditional models of education and skills development. There is a need to better adapt to students' needs and pursue innovative ICT-enabled teaching and learning models that are better engaging to youth. Digital and mobile technologies have created unprecedented opportunities to expand access to education and skills development. They enable interactive and transformational pedagogy to be introduced not only in classrooms but also outside as a continuum of learning and upskilling. ICT enables educational materials and content to be packaged as e-textbooks and learning apps. It augments prospects of real-time student and teacher information systems.

Worldwide, a variety of technologies is transforming the reach of education. In both developed and developing countries alike, blended and e-learning modalities have become powerful ways to reach learners. Technology can in fact help to set a level playing field for learning even in poorly resourced educational and training institutions. Yet, the effective and efficient adoption of technology for skills development and training is subject to many considerations. In addition to school education, for skills development too, the pace of adopting technology solutions to increase access to training as well as quality of learning is gathering speed. The ubiquitous presence of mobile telephones means that mLearning and other mobile-based services for workforce development of youth hold the promise of delivering high quality content with cost effective solutions.

In the light of transformational technology trends in recent years, the Forum will explore the great potential to harness the power of technology to improve access to skills development for the youth. The role they can play in transforming the pedagogy of teaching and training in a way that productively engages youth and enhances employability and workplace performance will be explored.
