Sessions objectives and expected outcomes: With over 250 million migrant workers there is an enormous flow of workers from rural to urban areas in the PRC. In general, migrant workers earn less, and among them migrant women workers earn the least. They face gender wage discrimination compared to migrant men, are more likely to be employed in the private and informal sectors, and have the lowest self-reported well-being of all groups. The session will explore some of these themes and discuss the social impact of migration on female migrant workers.

11:00–12:30 Session 6: Emerging Issues Affecting Gender Equality in the Labor Market in the PRC—Gender, Entrepreneurship and the Care Economy

Session objectives and expected outcomes: The transition of the Chinese economy from a planned to market economy since 1978, while associated with a dramatic rise in income per capita, has led to a decrease in publicly and work unit provided care services, with women shouldering the largest burden of unpaid child and elder care. How does unpaid care work affects women's opportunities and gender equality? This session will also provide a summary of policy lessons for programming of women's entrepreneurship interventions and strategies. This session will explore some of these themes and recommend policies to address them.
