Upgrading Human Capital and Skills Development for Future Asia

Technological advancement and associated industrial transformation will likely accompany fundamental changes in how we work machineries and artificial intelligence (AI) perform duties beyond routine and manual tasks while cyber working platforms such as mobile office and cloud sourcing allow tasks to be divided and performed anywhere by anyone with the right skills and equipment. In developing Asia, workers are moving rapidly from agriculture to manufacturing and services resulting in an increasing demand for skilled workers.

Human capital and skills development interventions from primary to higher education and technical-vocational trainings must adopt quickly to meet the changing demand for skills. As uncertain as we are on how the future work would look like, it is increasingly important to equip workers to "learn to learn" and be adaptable. Lifelong training is essential in upgrading and acquiring new skills to improve employability and productivity of workforce, including youth who have long working life ahead. Skills development and technologies that boost the productivity of senior workforce are crucial to some of the aging and aged societies. The Asian region consists of countries with varying levels of development, technological adoption, and demographic composition. With an increasing need for a skilled workforce, it has much to gain from regional collaboration through cooperation in skill-building activities and encouraging cross-border labor mobility.

Policy makers in the region need updated information and evaluation of human capital and skills development policies and programs to prepare its workforce for future jobs. They would need to know the types of skills needed in future work, innovative educational approaches and methods that will enhance productivity and employability of workers of all ages, and the available and emerging technologies that could be tapped for this purpose.

This year's ADB-Asian Think Tank Development Forum will provide a venue to share ideas and experiences among affiliated scholars on the human capital and skills development for future jobs by attempting to explore the following questions:

- 1. What are the examples of existing human capital and skills development programs and interventions that can boot the productivity and employability workers for future jobs?
- 2. What are the emerging technologies that are available to foster human resource and capital development (labor force participation, health, and education), and boost productivities? How effective are the existing programs, if any?
- 3. What is the role of regional cooperation in addressing the challenges associated with the development of human capital and skills? Can Asia collectively provide a better platform to efficiently and effectively develop and manage physical, financial, and human resources, for example, by building supportive infrastructure to broaden access to technology and improve cross-border labor and student mobility?
