Professor Michael Flood is an internationally recognized researcher on men, masculinities, and violence prevention. He has contributed to national and international frameworks for violence prevention, explored community understandings of domestic violence, and led international research and advocacy on engaging men and boys in prevention. Professor Flood is the author of Engaging Men and Boys in Violence Prevention (2019), the co-author of Masculinity and Violent Extremism (2022), and the lead editor of Engaging Men in Building Gender Equality (2015) and The International Encyclopedia of Men and Masculinities (2007). He is also an advocate and educator. Professor Flood is based at the Queensland University of Technology in Australia.



SARANZAYA GERELT-OD

Senior Gender Officer Gender Equality Division Asian Development Bank Saranzaya Gerelt-Od is a gender specialist and human rights advocate specializing in women's rights, social justice, genderbased violence, and gender and conflict. She has worked with civil society and development organizations in Mongolia and Asia and the Pacific region for over 10 years. Specifically, she worked as a GBV Prevention and Public Awareness Program Manager at Beautiful Hearts Against Sexual Violence NGO, focusing on GBV prevention, policy advocacy, and social movements. Additionally, she held the position of Senior Gender Specialist at The Asia Foundation and acted as an Advisor for the Global Resilience Fund in various feminist philanthropy organizations, such as FRIDA and We Are Purposeful. Since 2023, she has been working as a Senior Gender Officer for the Asian Development Bank (ADB) at the Mongolia Resident Mission.

Her expertise includes working on men and masculinities for gender justice, community-based approaches for the prevention of SGBV, women's empowerment, youth engagement, child development, and the prevention of alcohol and drug abuse in Sri Lanka and South Asia. Samitha has contributed to the drafting and implementation of the National Action Plan on addressing SGBV in Sri Lanka (2016-2020) and is a steering committee member for the New Action Plan for 2024-2028. Additionally, she is a core steering committee member for the implementation of the National Action Plan on Women, Peace, and Security in Sri Lanka.

Ravi Verma is the Executive Director of the International Center for Research on Women (ICRW). Ravi has over three decades of experience addressing issues related to the empowerment of girls and women, men and masculinities, and gender equality. His research is primarily focused on primary violence prevention, prevention of child marriage, sexual and reproductive health issues, and the engagement of men in addressing masculine norms. Throughout his career, he has held various positions within the Government of India, served as a professor at the International Institute for Population Sciences, and functioned as a member of the High-Level Committee on the Status of Women (HLCSW). Ravi also serves on many strategic, National and International Advisory Boards and committees. Notable among them is the Lancet Commission on Gender and Global Health, which he serves as one of the Commissioners and the Advisory Boards of Global Health 5050 and FP 2030.
