



# 11th ADB International Education and Skills Forum

Applying a Fresh Lens to Unlock  
the Power of Human Capital

3-5 December 2025 | Metro Manila, Philippines



Countries across Asia and the Pacific face major transformations that are having a profound impact on education and skills. Policymakers, practitioners, and learners face complex challenges driven by economic and societal shifts. The rapid pace of economic restructuring, widespread digital transformation, accelerating green and demographic transitions, and growing climate-related vulnerabilities now demand a new lens to be adapted in education and training systems, to unlock the full potential of the region's human capital. Innovative practices and partnerships are needed to shape inclusive, skills-driven, and sustainable education.

The Forum is set to stimulate in-depth discussions on critical themes concerning education and skills in the region and beyond—from foundational learning and AI to teacher roles, youth employment, and vocational excellence—through targeted sessions across K–12, TVET, and higher education. It aims to foster regional and international cooperation and support a partnership-based approach to meet the education demands of the future.

The Forum will revolve around a 3x3x3 lens in the discussions and debates:

Three **themes** addressing transformative features to reimagine and rejuvenate education systems:

- Realizing the potential of digital transformation of education and EdTech at scale.
- Promoting green and climate resilience skills to serve priority economic sectors for inclusive and sustainable growth; and
- Unlocking the role of education and training for future jobs in multisector contexts such as health and elderly care, high-tech and climate-smart agriculture, sustainable transport, clean energy and resilient water sector.

Three **dimensions** addressing targets, standards, and impact aspirations in education and training delivery:

- Enhancing quality and how it is measured and monitored, including student learning assessments and employability results;
- Supporting inclusion and equity, including attention to newer dimensions of exclusion and disadvantage; and
- Building the future-readiness of education and training systems.

Three **levels** of education and training systems:

- Identifying new departures for investments in K-12 from early childhood education to senior secondary education;
- Channeling investments in technical and vocational education and training to deliver results in employability, productivity and competitiveness; and
- Accelerating developments in higher education and research and innovation in future-oriented areas of science and technology.

As the flagship education event of ADB's human and social development sector, the Forum brings together key stakeholders in Asia and the Pacific region and beyond—policymakers, academia, private sector, international organizations, and leading global experts—to discuss current and future trends and perspectives and unlock the power of human capital across the region.
