
Recent migration trends to OECD and selected non-OECD countries from Asia

International Migrant Stock by Region of Destination, Annual rate of change, 1990–2017



Migration flows from Asia to OECD Countries, 2000-2016


Top 15 Asian countries of origin for migration to OECD countries, 2016

All categories of temporary migration to the OECD are increasing (except ICTs)





Most H-1B Visas Delivered in the USA g to Indians and other Asians


H-1B Visas Delivered, by Region of Origin, 2010–2017, thousands






Foreign Students by Region of Origin, Worldwide, 2000–2016


A. Number of foreign students by region of origin








Share of Asia in Global International Student Mobility, 2016




B. As a region of destination for foreign students

Migrants from Asia have recovered from the crisis faster than other migrants in most OECD countries



An unprecedented number of asylum applications across OECD countries


Evolution of the number of new asylum seekers, 1980-2018


