
## Overall ADB Cofinancing in 2018

Of the \$7.19 billion in commitments in 2018, \$7.06 billion (98%) was for investment project cofinancing and \$130 million (2%) for technical assistance cofinancing.

### PROJECT-SPECIFIC vs. TRUST FUND Cofinancing

Project-specific cofinancing made up 94% of the 2018 total, while trust fund cofinancing peaked at 6%.

## OBJECTIVES

- ☑ To **reduce poverty** and **support capacity building** efforts in ADB DMCs

## MODALITIES

- ☑ Technical Assistance and Project Grants

## PRIORITY AREAS

- ☑ All sectors, focusing on poverty reduction using innovative approaches

## FUNDING

- ☑ **\$40M — \$50M** in total (indicative annual commitment)
- ☑ **\$2M** for TA and **\$3M** for project grant (ceiling amount per proposal)

## PROCESSING TIME

- ☑ 2.5 month after ITD submission

## Ways to Enhance Agricultural Productivity



Enhanced Agricultural Value Chains for Sustainable Livelihoods built more than 2,800 potato and onion storage facilities in Bamyan, Kabul and Parwan, helping farmers reduce their potato harvest losses by as much as 40%.

#### RESULTS AT A GLANCE

- ✓ The project trained 12,458 farmers, of which 20% were female beneficiaries
- ✓ Formed 127 male farmer cooperatives and 55 female farmer cooperatives
- ✓ Built 2,807 potato and onion zero energy farmers and communities storage facilities in Bamyan, Kabul, and Parwan
- ✓ Reduced losses in potato storage from 40% to 3%
- ✓ Reduced losses in onion storage from 40% to 19%

City masterplans for Ulaanbaatar, Mongolia now include the ger districts—unplanned areas unconnected to basic urban services, including water supply and sanitation. A development strategy for ger areas is a key component of city masterplans to be funded by a 10-year, \$320 million [investment program](#).
