



- ADB-WWF Memorandum of Understanding (MoU), signed on 26 Sept 2001 is ADB's first accord with a nongovernment organization. The MoU established a basis for information sharing, knowledge management, and capacity building
- ADB and WWF have been collaborated on large-scale environmental regional programs in Asia and the Pacific:
  - Greater Mekong Subregion (GMS)
  - Coral Triangle (CTI)
  - Heart of Borneo (HoB)
  - Living Himalayas (LHI)
  - water and climate change as cross-cutting themes
- ADB and WWF have jointly co-organized activities and side events and jointly produced knowledge publications




