The Universal Health Care Act 2019

- The Universal Health Care (UHC) Act of 2019 mandates the strengthening of primary health care and the development of a cadre of health professionals competent to deliver primary care services.
 - 1. Reorient health care professional and health care worker curricula towards **primary health care**, with emphasis on public health and primary care
 - Determine recommended areas of study in public health to be incorporated in the curriculum of all health sciences education
 - Incorporate educational outcomes focusing on primary care in the education programs, the scope of licensure examinations, and continuing professional development

The Primary Care Competencies (PCCs) published by the Department of Health are as follows:

Individual- based	PROVIDING FIRST CONTACT CARE (PC-FCC)	Ability to provide necessary health services within a time frame appropriate to the urgency of the health problem
	PROVIDING PRIMARY COMPREHENSIVE CARE (PC-COM)	Ability to provide a wide range of health services that meet common needs across all life stages
	PROVIDING CONTINUING CARE (PC-CON)	Ability to provide a sustained partnership with the patient in the management of his/her condition
	COORDINATING CARE (PC-COO)	Ability to transfer and share responsibility across disciplines and levels of care
	MANAGING PATIENT RECORDS (PC-MPR)	Ability to ensure coordination of care through accurate and timely integration of medical records in the healthcare provider network
Population- based	PROMOTING HEALTH (PC-PH)	Ability to identify, describe, and implement programs, policies, and other health promotion interventions that are empowering, participatory, holistic, inter-sectoral, equitable, sustainable, and multi-strategic in nature
	IMPLEMENTING PUBLIC HEALTH FUNCTIONS (PC-IPH)	Ability to implement public health/ population health services as mandated by the Department of Health

Reorientation of BSN Curriculum to Primary Health Care

- 1. Reassessment of the learning outcomes at the program and course levels to ensure that the performance indicators are operationalized in the target courses to develop the expected primary care competencies.
- 2. Determination of whether the minimum content standards for primary health care provided by both the DOH and the CHED TP/TC are sufficiently covered in their current curriculum.
- 3. Ensure constructive alignment of teachinglearning strategies and assessments with defined learning outcomes and content standards.




