Understand local needs to target resources effectively, to foster participation and increase accountability.*

*Legal and fiscal decentralization according to the principle of subsidiarity is required to carry out these tasks.







Local economic development strategies



Drive national development from the bottom up to create balanced systems of cities



Bring together and balance all sectors and interests in their communities. They can and should play a leadership role in developing and implementing a shared vision for the future.



Act locally to address global challenges and to manage the impact of global phenomena at local level (climate change adaptation, migration, the mediation of globalizing economic and cultural forces).



Local governments can contribute to more effective and accountable international governance if we are recognized as a sphere of government and given a seat at the global table.




