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

- Scaling up lessons learned and applying new innovations
- Long-term pandemic impacts e.g. fiscal effects, restoring trust, health insurance, endemic COVID-19 with persistent needs for vaccines, health workforce






Universal Health Coverage (UHC)

Underlying influences on health

Rapid Urbanization & Climate Change

- Air, noise, and water pollution
- Extreme heat events
- Road traffic injuries
- Limited primary health care access

Decentralization & Regional Cooperation

- Limited central resources
- Cross-border risks during health emergencies
- Gaps in information sharing

Demographic Trends

- Youth bulge in some DMCs, rapid aging in others
- Increasing NCDs
- Demand for elderly care services rising

Digitalization


- Health worker shortage
- Rising health needs burdening existing systems
- Limited access to high quality & convenient health services






Health impact of ageing in Asia and the Pacific

- Fastest aging region in the world
- By 2050, 11 economies in Asia and the Pacific region will be classified as "super aged", and almost a quarter of the region's population will be over 60.
- MORE elderly = MORE complex and chronic health conditions to manage → highest rates of NCD mortality globally
- LOW stock of formal LTC workers + overreliance on informal care, performed by women






Outlook

- More demand for knowledge products














Health sector directional guide









Major health contractors, 2018-2022
