Basic Function



Institutional Policies of Interest

Policies are generally longstanding but periodically updated

1995 Policy on Governance

Promotes strong governance and sound development management

1998 Policy on Cooperation with NGOs

Outlines ADB's Engagement with Civil Society at the policy level.

2003 Policy on Gender and Development

Guides ADB's activities directed at improving the status of women

1998 Anti-Corruption and Integrity Policy

Reduces the burden corruption exacts from the governments and economies of the region.

2009 Safeguards Policy

Addresses environmental and social risks in development projects to minimizes and mitigate, if not avoid, adverse project impact.

2012 Accountability Mechanism Policy

Establishes forums for those affected by ADB-assisted projects to voice their concerns.

2019 Access to Information Policy

Governs ADB's sharing of information and public communication

2021 Energy Policy

Guides ADB's operations in the Energy Sector

How do we define Civil Society Organizations?

How do we interact and partner together?

How do we Define Civil Society?

ADB defines "civil society organization" as those organizations

(i) not based in government, and(ii) not created to earn profit.

ADB defines CSOs as nonprofit organizations independent from the government, which operate around common interests. They vary in size, interests, and function, and include nongovernment organizations (NGOs), youth groups, community-based organizations, independent academic and research institutes, professional associations, foundations, faith-based organizations, people's organizations, and labor unions. CSOs represent interests of their members or others.

Advocacy Organizations



Advocacy CSOs provide representation for specific issues, concerns, points of view, or interests, and attempt to influence the policies, practices, and views of governments and institutions.

Many Organizations Are Both

Operational Organizations

Operational CSOs directly deliver, or contribute to the delivery of, welfare services such as emergency relief or environmental protection and management. They work at the community, local, district, national, regional, and international levels

Some Ways We Work with Advocacy CSOs

Policy Consultations

Example: CSO engages in consultations for the ongoing Safeguards Policy Review

Specific Thematic Issues

Example: CSO with expertise in women and girls engages to raise awareness about Gender Based Violence

Project Specific Issues

Example: CSO is concerned about the impacts of a wind turbine farm and advocates for an end to the project or change in design

Some Ways We Work with Operational CSOs

Consultations and Advisory

Example: CSO participates in community outreach on an ADB project.

Project Components

Example: CSO hired to conduct community WASH trainings alongside a water distribution investment.

CSO-Specific Funds (Rare)

Example: Funds specifically dedicated to Civil Society and COVID-19 Response.

CSOs are Contracted as Service Providers !! ADB Does Not Offer Grant Funding or Receive Unsolicited Proposals!!

Traditional Areas of CSO Engagement

- **Assisting and reaching communities (e.g., consultations)**
- Design and implementation of:
 - Involuntary resettlement plans
 - Indigenous peoples' plans
 - Gender Action Plans
- **Assessment and monitoring of environmental impacts**
- Delivering tailored services and programs to vulnerable groups
- Providing training, capacity building, and mentoring programs to local communities

Some Insider Tips

Anticipate What is Coming

Review the Country Partnership Strategy and COBPs/ICPs of countries to know where we are focusing

Get to Know Your Project Officers

Project Officers are the closest to the ground and have the best sense of what the projects need

Submit High Quality Proposals

Attention to detail and presentation matter! Submit professional, high-quality proposals

Keep a Close Eye on CMS!

Postings oftentimes are open 7-14 days and new opportunities are constantly arising


