### Overview of the NACC



- Operates independently of government
  - Led by a Commissioner and up to 3 Deputy Commissioners,
    with support from a CEO.
  - Oversight by a Parliamentary Joint Committee and an Inspector
- Broad jurisdiction to investigate serious or systemic corruption (including corruption that occurred before its establishment)
- Power to investigate ministers, parliamentarians and their staff,
  staff and contractors of all government entities, and any person
  who seeks to corrupt a public official
- Prevention and education function

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## Independence of the NACC

There are a number of mechanisms in place to ensure the NACC's independence, including:

1 Discretion on how to handle a matter

2 Discretion on how to conduct investigations

3 Security of tenure

## Accountability of the NACC

There are a number of mechanisms in place to ensure the NACC is accountable to the public, including:




#### Oversight by Parliamentary Joint Committee

- Review performance and budget
- Approve appointments of the Commissioner, Deputy Commissioners and Inspector



#### Oversight by Inspector

- Investigate corruption issues involving the Commission
- Audit Commission's operations
- Handle other complaints



#### Public reporting

- Investigation reports provided to Minister
- Reports tabled in Parliament where a public hearing has been held
- Commission can publish reports or other activities if satisfied it is in the public interest to do so
