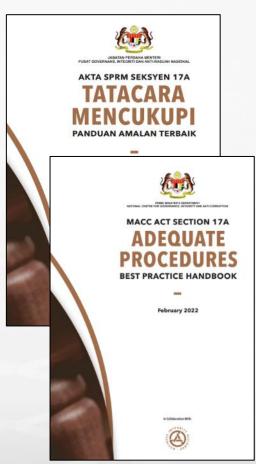




BIA Best Practice Handbook

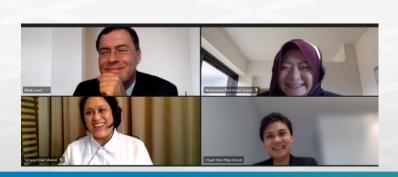




BIA Best Practice Sharing: TRUST Principles
