Every year, \$1 trillion is paid in bribes, while an estimated \$2.6 trillion are stolen annually through corruption.

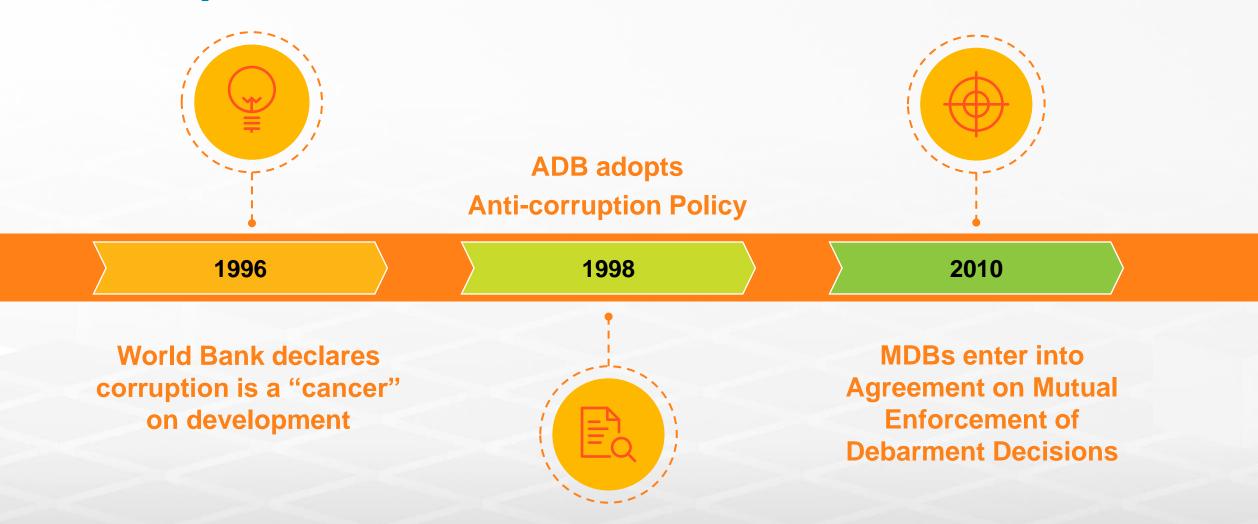
A sum equivalent to more than 5% of the global GDP.

The offering, giving, receiving, or soliciting, directly or indirectly, anything of value to improperly influence the actions of another party



Collusion

Obstruction







An arrangement between two or more entities without the knowledge, but designed to improperly influence the actions, of another party.

Any action, including misrepresentation, to obtain a financial or other benefit or avoid an obligation by deception.

















Impairing or harming, or threatening to impair or harm, directly or indirectly, any party or persons closely related to a party, to improperly influence the actions of that party.

















Theft, waste, or improper use of assets related to ADB-related activity, either committed intentionally or through reckless disregard [ADB Definition]

















- (a) Deliberately destroying, falsifying, altering, or concealing of evidence material to an ADB investigation;
- (b) Making false statements to investigators in order to materially impeded an ADB investigation;
- (c) Threatening of matters relevant to the investigation or pursuing the investigation; or
- (d) Materially impeding ADB's contractual rights of audit or access to information. [ADB Definition]

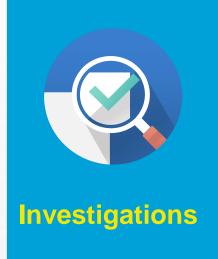






Allegations Received

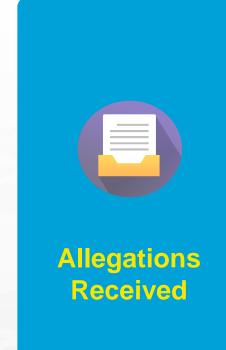


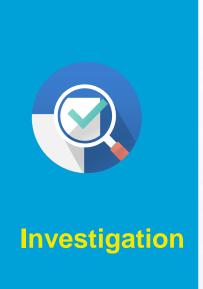
Investigation

- No coercive powers
- Investigations based on contractual audit rights
- Access to witnesses through audit rights
- Show cause letters











- Adjudication by first-tier officer (independent)
- Notice and right of response from accused
- Right to appeal
