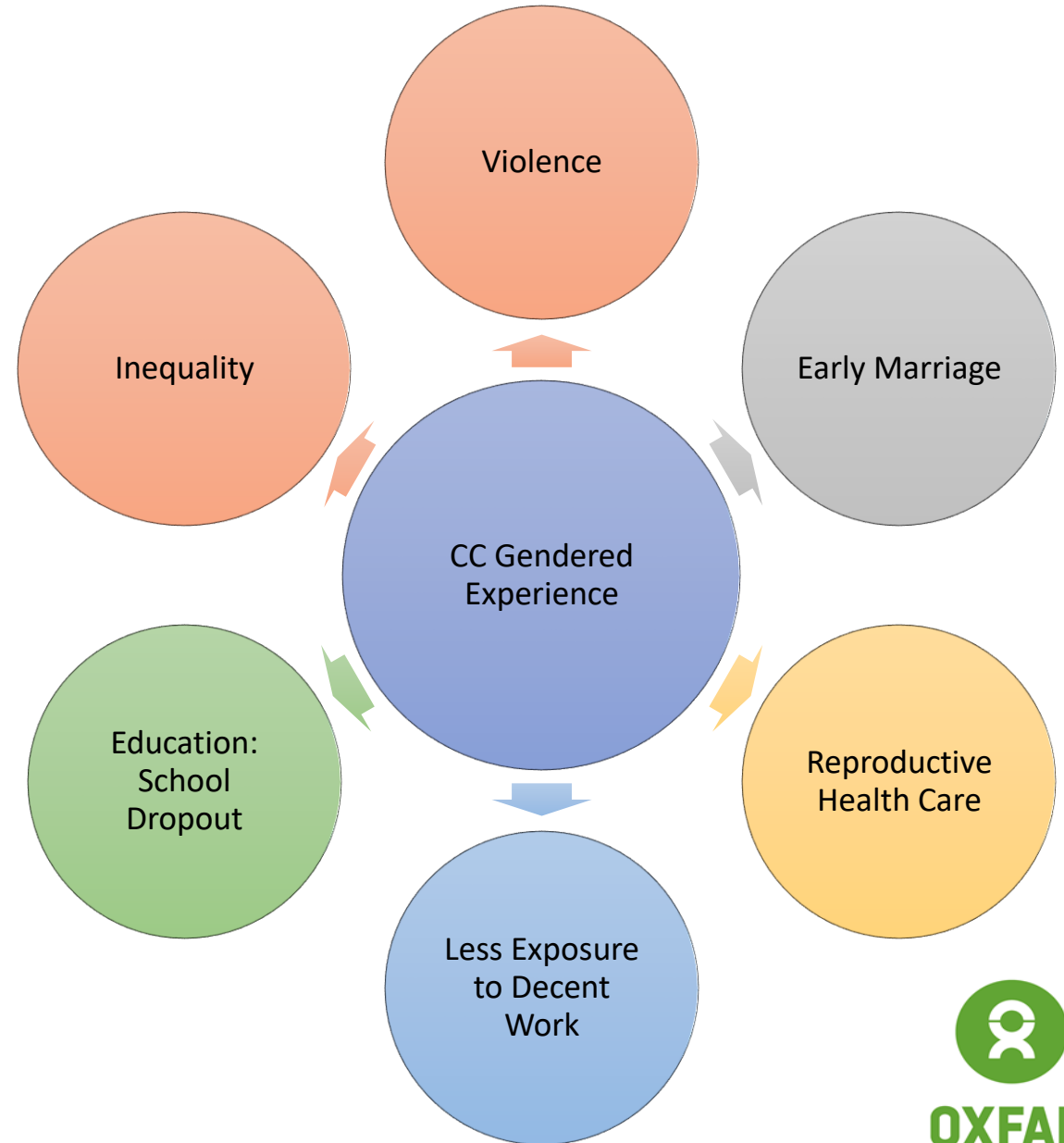

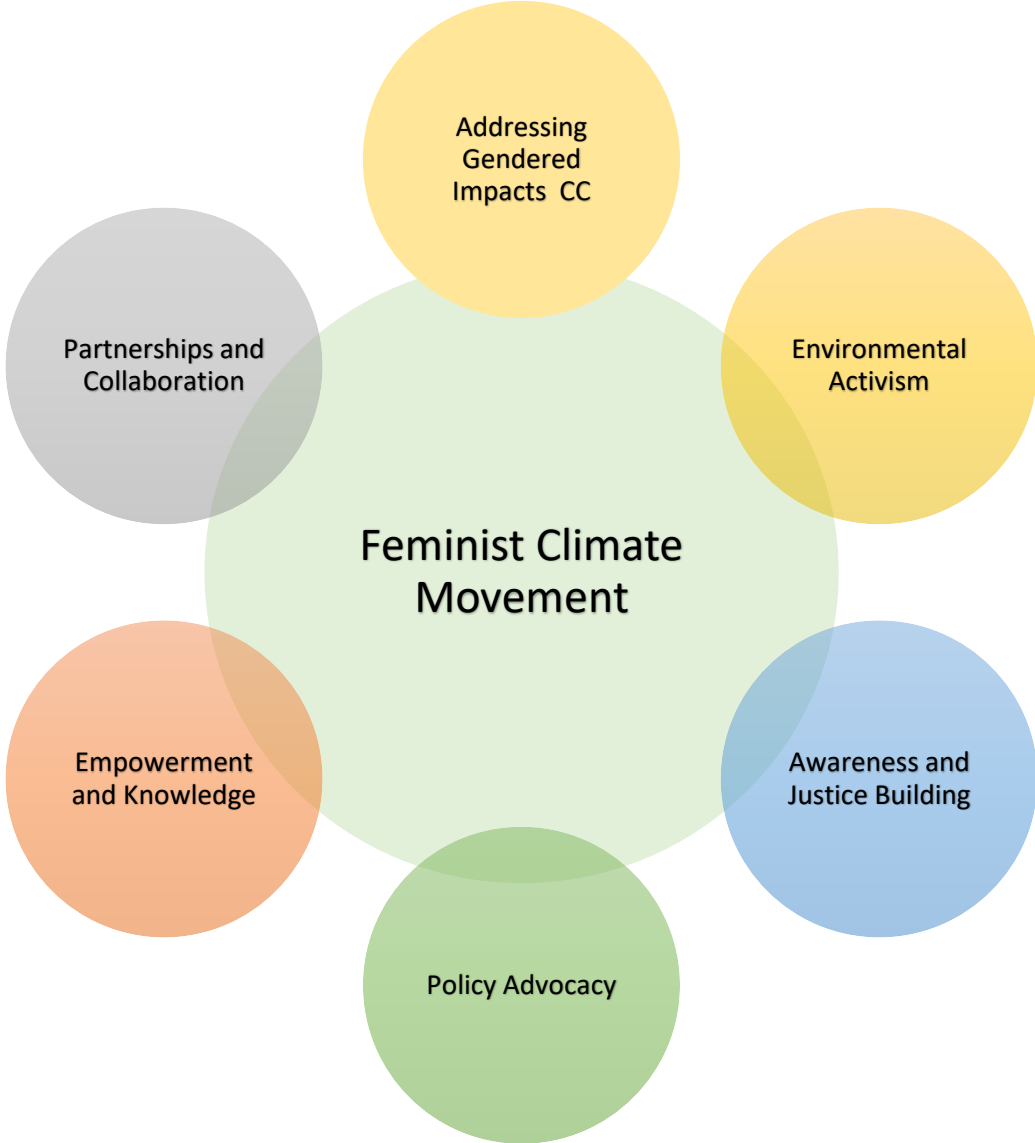
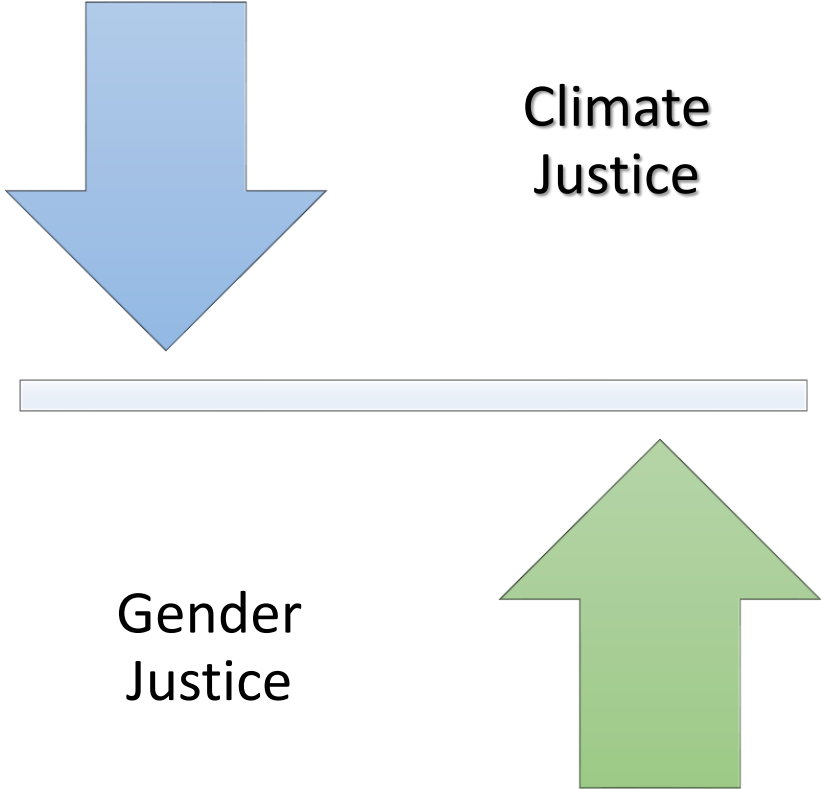

Climate Change-Gendered Experiences

- ❑ **Vulnerability:** Women are 14 times more likely to die in natural disasters. (UNDP)
- ❑ **Resource Access:** 70% of the world's poor are women, lacking access to land and finance. (UN Women)
- ❑ **Burdens:** Women spend 16 million hours daily fetching water, impacting health and income. (WHO)
- ❑ **Health Impacts:** Indoor air pollution causes 4.3 million premature deaths annually, affecting women and children. (WHO)
- ❑ **Decision-making:** Women hold only 24% of parliamentary seats globally. (UN Women)
- ❑ **Economic Disparities:** Women farmers face heightened risks from climate-related crop failures. (Oxfam)
