
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### **Cook Islands – Health & Safety Case studies**

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## Case Study One - COOK ISLANDS



### » Project

- Tereora College Rebuilding project NZ Funded
- July 2017 as a result of a complaint by Foreman onsite

#### » Issue

- Several Health and Safety practices not being applied
- Workers not provided with decent working conditions

#### » Outcome

- Worksite Inspections carried out, including reviewing of the health and safety document provided by the contractor
- Working conditions improved and health and safety measures was implemented

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## Country specific H&S Challenges – COOK ISLANDS



- » Geographical led Challenges
  - Skilled and qualified workers had to brought in from overseas (NZ)
  - Workers from overseas are better informed on what health and safety measures are not being implemented on the project
- » Sectorial led Challenges
  - Human- Resources skills shortages, workforce training and sector-specific labour market challenges
  - Operational issues production process and logistical challenges
- » Other country specific Challenges
  - Regulatory and Policy completion over compliance factors, govt priorities
  - Economic factors cost over completion factors, supply and demand needs

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### Case Study Two - COOK ISLANDS

#### Project – Customs Building Asbestos Removal


Safely replace asbestos tile roofing with profiled metal roofing, in a small work site, in a public area, during cyclone season.

#### n Issue

- Hazardous material
- Small work site.
- 3. Weather (cyclone season)
- 4. Sun

#### » Outcome

- Public health risk from airborne asbestos fibers
- Workers at risk of injury due to potential clutter and cross-contamination.
- 3. Public health and safety risk from unsafe structure
- 4. Worker health and safety risk from heat and sunstroke.

- » Geographical led Challenges
  - 1. Small worksite
  - Public area
- » Sectorial led Challenges
  - Lack of legislation /
     regulation regarding asbestos
     removal
  - Workers' nonchalant attitude towards health & safety









### » Burning Questions

- The Cook Islands is currently reforming its Workplace Health and Safety and Workers Compensation systems, with a new Bill that we hope to pass through Parliament this year
- The new Bill will look at Industry-led workplace health and safety practices, putting the onus on to the duty-holders of each Industry to lead codes of practices that fit the industry
- The role of the Labour Inspectorate is to carry our compliance inspections to the specific codes of practice provided by the Industry
- Does ADB want our asbestos?
- What is everyone else doing with theirs? There isn't enough land in the Cook Lands and it is expensive to send it overseas.
