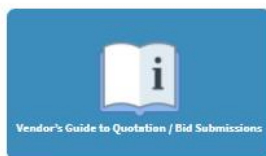

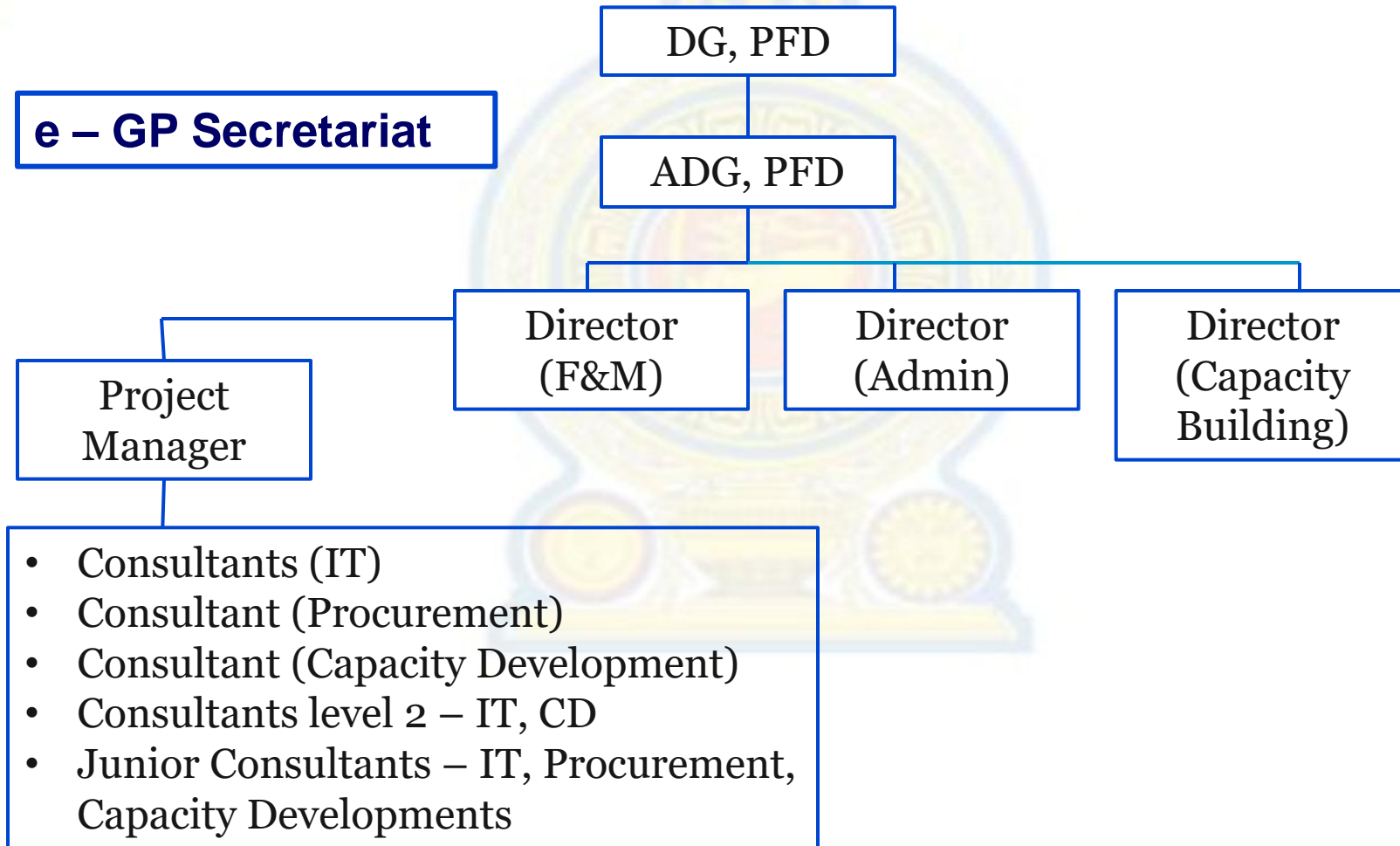

- US \$ 4.06 bn or 24% of Total Government Expenditure & 6.3% of GDP (2020) will be used for the procurements.
- 80% of the Total Capital Expenditure is related to the procurement activities
- 20% of 80% is for shopping procurements
- According to the World Bank studies, non availability of a e-GP System in the country cost the state approximately US\$ 1.2 Mn per month.

## **Current Status and Perspectives on e – Procurement - Size of e-Procurement**

Since using the e-GP platform is not mandatory, unable to provide the exact amount or percentage. However, comparing the usage of the Procurement Entities, around 10% of PEs use the shopping procedure through the e-GP platform.



# Current Status and Perspectives on e – Procurement - Past and Current Level of Stage on e- Procurement

- 2016 – e-GP readiness Assessment and Road Map was prepared.
- 2017 – Approval of the Cabinet of Ministers was granted to develop an e-GP system for Sri Lanka and establishment of e-GP Special Project Monitoring Committee
- 2018 – e-GP Secretariat was setup under the Department of Public Finance
- 2019- e-GP system development contract was awarded to Theekshana R&D, two Circulars were issued on the implementation of e-GP in Sri Lanka
- 2020 – Implementation of e-Bidding process for National Shopping Goods initiated under e-GP version 1, World Bank reviewed version 01.
- 2021-2022 Established e-GP implementation Committee, ICTA reviewed the e-GP system and recommended to revise the contract by issuing Addendum Advanced version (version – 02) of the e-GP system development.
- 2023 – Grant was received from the EU/World Bank under the Public Financial Strengthening Project for the e-GP System Development and new agreement signed with the existing contractor in accordance to the WB requirement.
- 2024 - Shopping Version 2.1 released. Software requirement specifications (SRS) completed. Version 3 development is ongoing (NCB)

# Current Status of e-GP Version 2.1

- The e-GP V2.1 was released in February 2024
- Form Base System
- Common Procurement Vocabulary (CPV) Codes are use for Vendor Registration
- Online evaluation can be carried out in V2.1
- Use Monolithic Architecture
- Jira software use to manage the issues and operational requirements communication
- The development of the comprehensive Software requirements specification (SRS) completed.
- Using Agile software development methodology, we are fine tuning the comprehensive SRS based upon the Stand Up meetings.
- The e-GP guidelines are currently being developed with the assistance of ADB.
- The Standing Bidding Documents and User Guides are currently being developed.
- An average of between 500 and 700 ongoing Shopping procurements
- There are 60 to 110 opening and closing of RFQs during the weekdays

# e-GP Regulatory Framework

- Cabinet approval for e-GP implementation was received in 2017.
- The following Circulars were issued on e-GP implementation
  - 05/2018 – Introduction of e-GP
  - 08/2019 – Implementation of e-GP
  - 08/2019 (i) and 08/2019 (ii)– Mandatory Publication of Procurement Notices and Awards over 200Mn
- e-GP Steering Committee
  - Special Monitoring and Evaluation Committee - 2017
  - Steering Committee Established - 2023
- e-GP Guidelines and Manuals preparation is underway by the e-GP Secretariat.



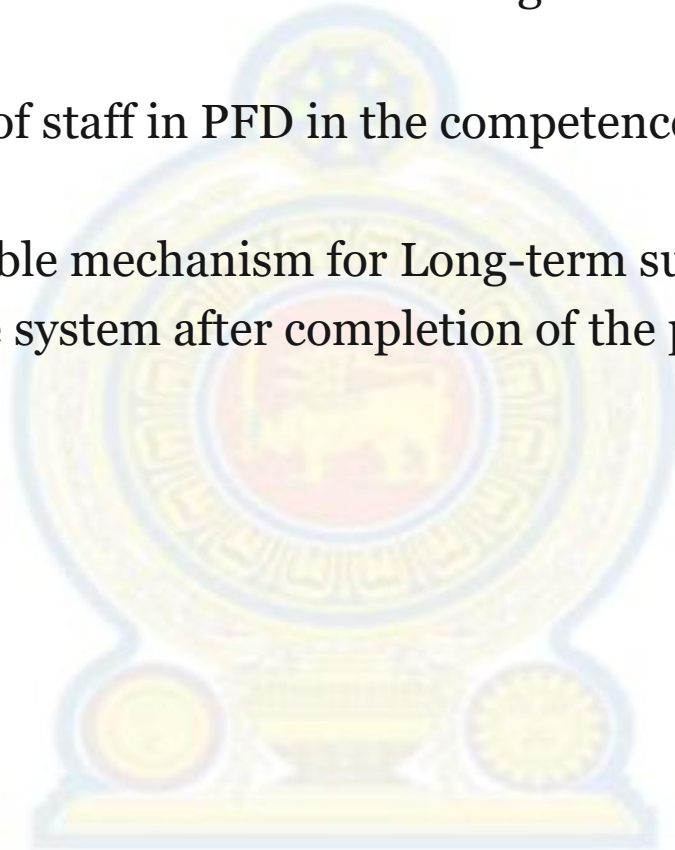
# Challenges & Issues on e-Procurement – Identify Major Challenges and Pending Issues on e - Procurement

- a. Business Process Reengineering (BPR) was not done at the initial stage.
- b. CPV structure is too complicated. Due to the complexity of the CPV code system, a simplified code structure is required.
- c. Project progress was delayed due to that the System Implement Partner (SIP) not competent to hire highly skilled staff
- d. Some key procurements like third party certification, cloud procurement were delayed due to delays in various approvals and decisions.
- e. Standard Bidding Documents issued by CIDA are supplied to the required stakeholders and are subject to payment.
- f. Vendors are reluctant to enter the system due to a lack of knowledge of handling IT systems.
- g. Business Registration does not define the field of the business.  
(the general nature of the business)
- h. Most stakeholders do not have a proper system to interface with the e-GP system.





- i. Procuring Entities are also reluctant to change from a manual system to a web-based system.
- j. Lack of knowledge of staff in PFD in the competence of IT field and hands-on experience
- k. Not identified suitable mechanism for Long-term sustain, maintenance and improvement of the system after completion of the project

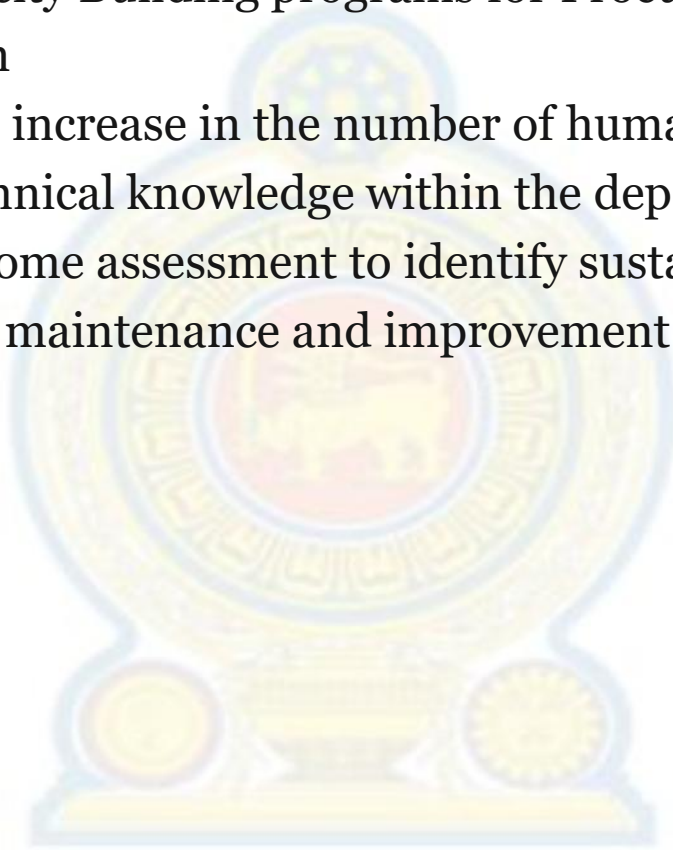


# Future Strategies and Solution on e- Procurement - Improving Strategies and Planning Action Plan for own Country

- a. It is identified to introduce a new code system based on the Chart of Accounts Structure currently used by the ITMIS.
- b. SIP has agreed to expedite the project as per the signed agreement.
- c. The department has to increase the number of human resources with IT knowledge competence.
- d. A proper mechanism should be defined to share the cost to CIDA
- e. Enhance the Capacity Development program for vendors to be aware of the use of the e-GP system
- f. Enhance the vendor registration system with the ability to upload financial statements, history of key contracts, and supporting documents
- g. Discussion is ongoing to seek the possibility of sharing supplier data between e-GP and Business Directory website (Rainbowpages. lk) platforms



- h. Mechanisms need to be introduced to interface the Stakeholder's system
- i. Enhance the Capacity Building programs for Procurement Entireties with some reward mechanism
- j. There needs to be an increase in the number of human resources with competence in technical knowledge within the department
- k. Needs to be done some assessment to identify sustainable mechanisms for long-term sustainment, maintenance and improvement of the system
