Overview and Timeline

• UNEA Resolution 5/14 entitled "End plastic pollution: Towards an international legally binding instrument"



- Intergovernmental Negotiating Committee Meetings: representing governments, academia, civil society organizations, private sector entities, UN entities, and international organizations
- INC-5 Busan, Republic of Korea: November 25 to December 1, 2024



Possible Core Obligations

Primary plastic polymers	Chemicals and polymers of concern	Problematic/ avoidable plastic, microplastics	Safe, sustainable alternatives and substitutes

Substantial discussions on scope

Ad Hoc Intersessional Open-ended Expert Groups

- Strictly technical in nature, no negotiations or decision-making
- To provide expert input, analysis and recommendations to support negotiations

Potential sources and means that could be mobilized for implementation incl.:

Options for the establishment of a financial mechanism

Alignment of financial flows and catalyzing finance

Criteria and non-criteria-based approaches concerning plastic products and chemicals of concern

Product design focusing on recyclability and reusability

- **Public sources** e.g. taxes, fees, grants and concessional financing, etc. and **private sources** e.g. debts, credits, allowances, etc.
- Criteria and non-criteria approaches e.g. guidelines, restrictions, regulations, etc.

Specific Issues in Focus: Financing and Implementation

Multilateral Fund

- Dedicated, stand-alone, multilateral, and independent fund.
- Hybrid approach with existing funds while working towards a dedicated fund.
- Use of Global Environment Facility (GEF) to avoid further fragmentation.

Plastic Pollution Fee

• Standalone or inclusion in EPR as the key modality to operationalize the polluter pays principle.

National Plans

- National action/implementation plans to be based on national circumstances and capabilities.
- Content of the national plans dependent to each country or guidelines/ list of content.

Implementation and Compliance • Facilitative and non-punitive mechanism that respects national sovereignty and considers national capacities and circumstances.

Key Financing Issues

Innovative Finance

- Within the instrument or to be explored by the Conference of Parties e.g. levies, PPP, credits, market-based approaches, etc.
- GPT can facilitate outcomes-based financing --- ties payment to achievement of outcomes (treaty objectives) and could align with plastic credits and EPR

Plastic Pollution Fee

- Proposal for a small fee based on the polluter pays principle.
- Polarizing discussions among states as issues include sovereignty concerns, double taxation/ levying, conflicts with EPR frameworks.

Multilateral Fund

- Questions on fund establishment, governance, contributions, length of time for setting up, how to channel resources from EPR.
- Developing countries advocate for a dedicated fund to ensure accessibility; Montreal Protocol highlighted

Key Takeaways and Outlooks

- The **scope of the instrument** is the key issue of debate.
 - What the "full lifecycle of plastic" entails
 - $\circ~$ Like Minded Group
 - African Group, High Ambition Coalition and the Pacific Small Island Developing States
 - Most parties are committed to finishing in 2024, but **possibility of compromised ambition**
- Intersessional work instrumental to inform and provide the context for Busan negotiations.
 - Proposal for primary plastic polymers was not considered for intersessional work
 - Exclusion of key elements in the upstream lifecycle of plastics may forebode potential content
 - Bridge to Busan Initiative to include primary plastic polymers (40 country signatories)
- Some convergence is emerging on **low hanging fruit issues**, such as waste management, need for plastic product design, just transition etc.
- Discussions whether there would be common global rules or voluntary measures based on national plans

Outcomes and Next Steps

- **Compiled text:** Basis for negotiations for INC-5.
- Informal head of delegation meeting 30 September to 1 October
- Expert group meeting reports October
- Establishment of legal drafting group to work at INC-5.
 - To ensure that the text is reflected in a legally sound manner and recommend to plenary
- Conclusion of treaty text end of 2024?
- **Opening for adoption** in 2025?
