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Mapping it backwards: Livelihood Restoration Outcomes and Ways to Get there

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#### What are the LR Outcomes to be Achieved?

- Enhanced, or at least restored livelihoods of displaced persons in real terms relative to pre-project levels
- Improved standards of living of the poor and other vulnerable

- → Permanent, temporary, partial or full economic displacement
- → Cash-based, wage income, subsistence production, natural resource utilization, non-cash-based transactions
- → An individual, a household, an enterprise or a community

### **Livelihood Types and Restoration Strategies**

- Land-based: agri-intensification, new crops, techniques, animal husbandry, value chain support)
- Non-land-based: employment, education/training/scholarships, fishery
- Business-based: existing or start-ups and enterprises
- Transitional support: allowance, special attention to vulnerable
- Consideration of women's and men's contributions, interests, rights obligations, limitations.

#### **Approaches to Livelihood Restoration**

- ☐ Replacement Principle: enable and assist to replace what is lost
- ☐ Stakeholder engagement: partners, experts, service, target audience
- □ **Design:** pre-defined vs tailor-made programs, focus on vulnerable, gender, short vs long term
- ☐ Implementation: in-house, through NGOs, consulting companies, through government programs, projects, government agencies

#### **Approaches to Livelihood Improvement**

☐ Capacity building: vocational education, skills training, mentorship ☐ Financial capability/inclusion: access to credit, financial literacy/counselling, financial helpline, debt workout schemes, savings ☐ Tapping to existing programs: social safety nets, pro-poor support programs, government or NGO run, self-help groups ☐ Partnerships and Collaboration: job placement, paid internship ☐ Behavioral Change: support adaptation in the new environment Bottom-up: gender sensitive, inclusive and participatory LRP design.

#### **Factors Impacting Achievement of Outcomes**

- Finding and facilitating access to replacement agricultural land
- Alignment of project livelihood program with gov't programs, land-use plans, support mechanisms
- Recognizing the long-term nature of LR: e.g. 3–5-year planning and budgeting horizon
- Establishing reliable baseline data for consistent evaluation
- Engaging qualified and experienced experts to design/implement LRP
- Facilitating employment with project contractors/job placement of affected persons

## Mapping Backwards: Achieving LR Outcomes

Increased income levels	Access to markets
Diversified income sources	Improved capacity/skills
Obtained security of tenure	Increased farm yield
Improved household food security	Improvements in consumption and diet
Gender-responsive livelihood opportunities	Resilience to natural or economic shocks

#### **Livelihood Restoration Elements**

Duration and Magnitude of Impact	Livelihood Restoration Elements (in <u>addition to compensation</u> for lost land/assets)
1. <b>Temporary</b> (can resume in same location. i.e. loss of crops during construction, business disruption)	Compensation for livelihood disruption
2. Permanent, partial loss, not severe, can resume in the remaining/nearby plot	Compensation for livelihood disruption, cost of reestablishing business/livelihood activities

#### **Livelihood Restoration Elements**

Duration and Magnitude of Impact	Livelihood Restoration Elements (in <u>addition to compensation</u> for lost land/assets)
3. Permanent, full loss, severe, able to resume elsewhere	Compensation for permanent income loss, relocation allowance, transitional support, severe impact allowance, consider livelihood restoration assistance
4. <b>Permanent</b> and <b>impossible</b> to continue <b>same livelihood</b> model	Full livelihood restoration plan spanning beyond the physical project, involving lifestyle/value changes and adaptation
